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Understanding Your Financial Aid

At Emmanuel, there are two types of financial aid to support your education:

MERIT SCHOLARSHIPS/NON-NEED-BASED FINANCIAL AID

Merit scholarships are determined at the time of admission and are based on your academic achievements. Key scholarship opportunities include:

- Dean's Scholarship
- Academic Achievement Scholarship

The College also offers scholarships at the time of admission to recognize the wide variety of ways in which we believe a student will be a valuable addition to the Emmanuel community, such as:

NEED-BASED FINANCIAL AID

Need-based financial aid is designed to assist students with demonstrated financial need and requires completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

This aid includes a combination of:

- Federal Grants
- State Grants
- Emmanuel-Funded Grants and Scholarships
- Student Loans

Student Spotlight: NATIONAL RECOGNITION FOR STUDENT RESEARCH

Biotechnology major Astrid Noriega '26 and Biology major Kiana Rodriguez '27 earned national recognition for outstanding poster presentations at the Biomedical Research Conference for Minoritized Scientists (ABRCMS), held in November 2025 in San Antonio, Texas. Competing in a field of thousands of emerging researchers, the students were recognized for their research in microbiology and cancer biology.

Their awards reflect the rigor of their work and the advanced research preparation supporting their future paths in science and health.

Both Noriega and Rodriguez are Beckman Scholars, a selective 15-month program that supports intensive, faculty-mentored research through funded stipends, research supplies, and hands-on experience.





Estimating Your Cost

While each semester is billed separately, it's best to plan ahead and budget for the entire academic year in advance. Below are the costs for the 2026-2027 academic year.

Nursing Program Fee: \$1,250 per semester

All students are required to have health insurance coverage; students without health insurance may purchase the College's plan with Blue Cross Blue Shield at an estimated annual cost of \$3,900.

INDIRECT COSTS

Students may want to plan for indirect expenses such as transportation, personal expenses, and books and supplies. Although the amounts may vary, below are some annual estimates to help with your planning.

- Transportation: \$450
- Personal Expenses: \$2,250
- Books and Supplies: \$600

Planning For Payment & Financing Options

The fall semester tuition bill is available in July and due in early August. The spring semester tuition bill is available in December and due in early January. The bill is available via EC Online Services at ecss.emmanuel.edu/student.

After scholarships and financial aid, the remaining cost may be covered through one or a combination of payment methods. In addition to ACH, credit card, check, and 529/College Savings Plan payments, there are other financing options available. MONTHLY PAYMENT PLAN

Emmanuel offers an interest-free monthly payment plan, allowing families to spread payments over a five-month period each semester. The fall semester plan starts on July 15th, and the spring semester plan starts on December 15th. For more information, visit www.emmanuel.edu/paymentplan.

PARENT AND STUDENT LOANS

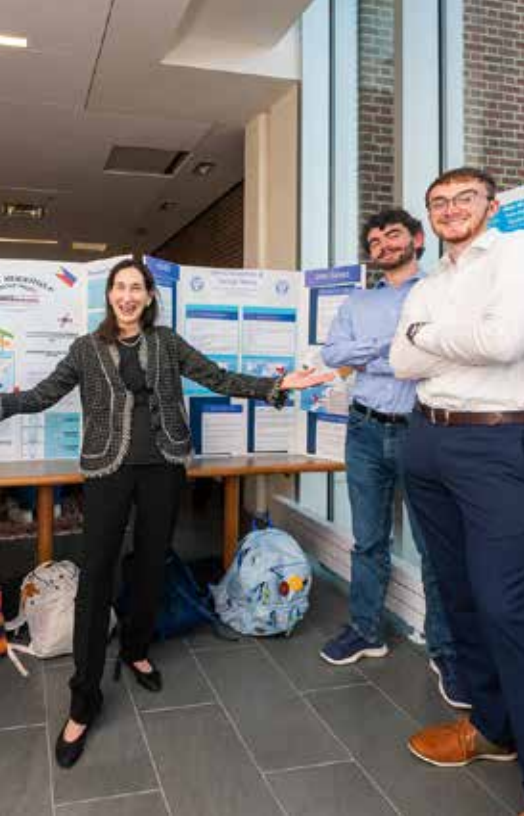
Federal Direct PLUS Loan: A federal loan program for parents who pass a basic credit check. For more details, visit www.studentaid.gov/loans.

Private Loans: Education loans for parents and students offered by major banks, credit unions, and other financial institutions. Eligibility criteria vary across lenders, but typically credit score and income are considered. Most lenders require students to have a cosigner. For more details, visit www.elmselect.com.

Student Spotlight: CAMERON HOWARD '25

As a student, Cameron charted a path toward law grounded in constitutional study and real-world experience. An economics graduate, he built a strong foundation through internships with the U.S. Attorney's Office in Boston, U.S. Senator Joni Ernst, and a leading Boston lobbying firm.

Selected as a Constitutional Studies fellow by the Hertog Foundation during the summer after graduation, Cameron studied key legal questions alongside national scholars in Washington, D.C. Now a Lead Organizer for a congressional campaign in Iowa, he is preparing for the LSAT and applying to law school.



Working alongside Professor of Political Science Dr. Lenore Martin, Cameron researched the impact of ethnic minorities on foreign policy, with a focus on the Kurdish minority in Turkey. He later presented his work at the Northeastern Political Science Association annual meeting.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOUR FIRST YEAR

PRIVATE SCHOLARSHIPS

TEACH GRANT

The Teacher Education Assistance for College and Higher Education (TEACH) Grant is a federal grant of up to \$4,000 awarded annually to students intending to teach in a TEACH-approved field.

VETERANS EDUCATION BENEFITS

A wide range of education benefits are available to veterans and their dependents through the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). Emmanuel College is a proud participant in the Yellow Ribbon Program.

STATE SCHOLARSHIPS AND GRANTS

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts offers a range of scholarships and grants to support Massachusetts residents in achieving their educational goals. These opportunities are available to eligible students who complete the FAFSA and meet specific program requirements.

- **MASSGrant and Gilbert Grant:** Available to students who demonstrate financial need, these programs provide essential funding for full-time undergraduate students. Simply complete the FAFSA to be considered.
- **High Demand Scholarship:** This program supports students pursuing degrees in high-demand fields. In addition to completing the FAFSA, a separate application is required. Emmanuel students have historically been strong candidates, with many selected each year.

Student Spotlight: GABRIEL EDUARTE '26

For Gabriel Eduarte, receiving a scholarship from Emmanuel has been transformational. A double major in finance and economics, as well as a resident assistant and a member of the Saints Men's Soccer Team, Gabriel credits the scholarship with allowing him to fully immerse himself in the Emmanuel experience.

"My scholarship from Emmanuel has been life-changing," he said. "It has given me the freedom to fully experience everything the College has to offer, from competing on the field to thriving in the classroom. It has really boosted my confidence at Emmanuel."

Alongside his academic and athletic achievements, Gabriel completed an internship with the Pentair Finance Leadership Development Program in summer 2025. His experience reflects how Emmanuel supports students in pursuing their goals on campus and beyond.





Opportunities For Future Years

EMMANUEL COLLEGE ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIPS

These are scholarships for currently enrolled students funded by alumni and friends of the College. Scholarships are awarded according to academic performance, service and/or leadership accomplishments, community affiliation, and financial need. The application for the upcoming academic year's scholarships becomes available each December and is due in February.

RESIDENT ASSISTANT SCHOLARSHIP

Students selected as Resident Assistants (RA) receive a scholarship for 75% of their room and board charges in their first year as an RA and for 100% of room and board charges for subsequent years of service. Sophomores, juniors and seniors may apply.

PRIVATE SCHOLARSHIPS

Private scholarships are not limited to first-year students. Many currently enrolled students apply for and receive outside funding each year. In addition to your own research, the Office of Student Financial Services shares opportunities as we become aware of them and are committed to keeping students informed.

SUPPORT FOR EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

Emmanuel students may be considered for funding to help offset the cost of experiential learning activities. Experiential learning encompasses a wide range of opportunities, such as unpaid internships, service learning (e.g. Alternative Spring Break), study abroad, student faculty research, etc.

Student Spotlight:

BUILDING COMMUNITY AT THE CARDINAL'S NEST CAFÉ

The Cardinal's Nest Café is more than just a coffee shop—it's a hands-on learning experience and a chance to create a welcoming community space on campus. Run entirely by students, the café operates under the Emmanuel Business Collaborative (ECB) and offers its team an opportunity to manage a real business.

"It's different from working elsewhere because we get the full-scale experience of a business and can gear it towards our peers as well," said Ella Poor '25, General Manager and a management major.



The team, which also includes Maya Galindo '26, Ryan Ragosta '26, and Caspian Reardon-Fargo '26, manages everything from event planning and inventory to marketing and budgeting.

"It's really important to have a place like that on campus. It's so easy to get stuck in the habit of going from the dorm to classes and back," Galindo said.

Glossary

Cost of Attendance (COA): The total estimated cost to attend a college, including tuition, housing, food, fees, and indirect costs like books and transportation.

Direct Costs: Expenses billed directly by the college, such as tuition, fees, housing, and food.

FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid): The federal application required to apply for need-based financial aid, including grants, loans, and work-study opportunities.

Federal Direct Loans: Low-interest federal student loans available to students. Repayment typically begins after graduation, provided the student is enrolled at least half-time.

Subsidized Loans: Need-based loans; no interest while in school.

Unsubsidized Loans: Not need-based; interest accrues upon disbursement.

Federal Direct PLUS Loan: A federal loan program for parents who pass a basic credit check.

Federal Work-Study (FWS): A federally funded program that provides part-time employment opportunities for students with financial need.

Indirect Costs: Expenses not billed by the college but associated with attendance, such as transportation, personal expenses, and books.

Interest-Free Monthly Payment Plan: A payment option that spreads tuition costs over 5 installments without incurring interest.

Merit Scholarships/Non-Need-Based Aid: Scholarships awarded based on academic, leadership, or extracurricular achievements, without consideration of financial need.

Need-Based Financial Aid: Financial aid awarded based on a student's demonstrated financial need, determined through the FAFSA.

Private Student Loans: Education loans offered by private banks or lenders, often requiring a cosigner and based on creditworthiness.

Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP): A standard set by colleges to ensure students are successfully progressing toward degree completion; necessary for maintaining financial aid eligibility.

Tuition Exchange Program: A scholarship program for dependents of employees at participating colleges and universities.

Veterans Education Benefits: Education benefits provided by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, such as the GI Bill and Yellow Ribbon Program, for veterans and their dependents.

Terms And Conditions

ACCEPTING YOUR FINANCIAL AID

To accept most types of aid simply submit your enrollment form and deposit to Emmanuel by May 1, 2026. Federal student loans and the Federal TEACH Grant require additional steps; for further details please see www.studentaid.gov.

ELIGIBILITY

Your financial aid is based upon the information you supplied through the 2026-2027 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Some students will see the word “estimated” noted at the top of their financial aid letter. This indicates your FAFSA was selected for a process known as Verification, in which colleges are required to confirm certain information on the FAFSA through supplemental documentation before finalizing your financial aid. If significant discrepancies are found as a result of verification, your financial aid eligibility may change.

Any change to your enrollment status or campus residency status must be reported to the Office of Student Financial Services (OSFS). Changes may result in an adjustment to your financial aid. If you receive outside financial assistance not included on your financial aid letter, such as a private scholarship or veterans education benefits, you must report this to the OSFS. Assistance from outside sources does not typically impact financial aid unless it exceeds the student’s demonstrated financial need or the cost of attendance.

RENEWABILITY

The renewal requirements for merit scholarships and non-need-based financial aid are outlined on the scholarship letter provided with your admission acceptance letter and published in the College’s Academic Catalog. Merit scholarships with a minimum cumulative grade point average (GPA) requirement are reviewed at the end of each academic year. Recipients who do not meet the required GPA are provided an additional probationary semester to meet the requirement. Students may receive their Emmanuel funded non-need-based financial aid for up to eight semesters with full-time enrollment. Students who become ineligible for non-need-based financial aid are still considered for need-based financial aid.

Need-based financial aid is awarded for one academic year at a time and contingent on the completion of the FAFSA each year. Students must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) according to the terms of the College’s policies as outlined in the Academic Catalog located at www.emmanuel.edu/catalog.

Check the Financial Aid Section of EC Online Services to see if you have any missing or incomplete financial documents. If you are accepting your Federal Direct Subsidized and/or Unsubsidized Loan, you must complete the loan requirements.
